Over 600 farmers learned about industry advancements and research during breakout sessions.

"Farming practices are constantly evolving and advancing, and our farmers need up-to-date information to help increase their bottom line," said Brian Hardin, the Federation's Governmental and Agricultural Programs Department director. "At this meeting, farmers can talk and glean information to take home to the farm."

Commodity committee members and leaders were also elected, and outgoing committee members who served three full terms were honored.

Divisions represented included Bee

& Honey; Beef; Cotton; Dairy; Equine; Forestry; Hay & Forage; Greenhouse, Nursery & Sod; Meat Goat & Sheep; Pork; Poultry; Soybean; Wheat & Feed Grain; and Wildlife.

Additionally, the Horticulture Division held its final meeting Feb. 6. During the Federation's annual meeting in December, delegates voted to merge the Horticulture Division with the Alabama Fruit & Vegetable Growers Association, a partner organization of the Federation.

The Alabama Peanut Producers Association met Feb. 7 in Dothan, while the Alabama TREASURE Forest Association board met Feb. 5 in Montgomery. The Alabama Catfish Producers met in December for its organizational session.

Agriculture & Industries Commissioner Rick Pate joined farmers for lunch all three days, outlining goals for the next four years and thanking the Federation for its support.

## Sign Up For Trade Aid Program By Feb. 14

The Market Facilitation Program (MFP) sign-up deadline is Feb. 14 as part of the trade mitigation program administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Farmers have until May 1 to certify their 2018 crop production.

Assistance to soybean growers is \$1.65 per bushel; corn, 1 cent per bushel; pork, \$8 per head; wheat, 14 cents per bushel; sorghum, 86 cents per bushel; and dairy (milk), 12 cents per hundredweight.

MFP payments are limited to a combined \$125,000 per person or legal entity for corn, cotton, sorghum, soybeans and wheat.

MFP payments are also limited to a combined \$125,000 for dairy and hog producers.



# **Alabama Delegates Attend Farm Bureau Convention**

ver 100 Alabama Farmers Federation members helped the American Farm Bureau Federation (AFBF) celebrate a century of service Jan. 11-16.

AFBF's 100th annual convention was held in New Orleans, where U.S. President Donald Trump addressed attendees for the second consecutive year. He assured the crowd of nearly 6,000 farmers from all 50 states and Puerto Rico that agriculture is a priority for his administration.

"The American farmer feeds and fuels and sustains our nation,"Trump said. "On every front we are fighting for our great farmers, great ranchers, great growers."

AFBF President Zippy Duvall echoed Trump's remarks, thanking the president for his support.

"With this administration giving us a seat at the table, we (worked) with them through tax reform, which lowered the tax rate for almost every farmer," he said.

At the convention, farmer-delegates voted on policy recommendations to chart AFBF's course for the next year.
