Damp Days Hamper Alabama Harvest

damp October slowed harvest across Alabama, with farmers like Jimmy Miller of Blount County estimating combines and pickers will still be rolling into December.

"We've had a good production year, but in October, which is normally our driest month, we received over 4 inches of rain," said Miller, who raised peanuts and cotton this year on his family's farm in Snead. "It's been a challenging harvest. We'll harvest cotton two days, then it rains again."

Cotton picked in September was excellent, Miller said. In October, warmer temperatures and additional moisture tacked on more second growth, lowering quality.

Wet fields have stalled combining Miller's final 20 acres of dug peanuts, though he said overall quality has been good.

"Everyone seems to be having weather problems," Miller said. "From a yield standpoint, I feel fortunate. We're probably above average on yields of all crops except peanuts."

According to the U.S.
Department of Agriculture's Nov. 5
Crop Progress and Condition Report,
66 percent of the state's cotton crop
is harvested. Seventy-eight percent
of peanuts are harvested, while an
additional 14 percent are waiting
to be combined. For soybeans, 69
percent are harvested. Farmers are
preparing for 2019, too, with 25
percent of winter wheat planted.

USDA's most recent forecast estimated cotton production at 1.12 million bales, while peanut production is forecast at 668 million pounds.

Skeet Shoot Raises Over \$37,000 For Education



The third annual Alabama Farmers Agriculture Foundation Skeet Shoot raised over \$37,000 for scholarships and agriculture education Nov. 2. Thirty-six teams competed at the annual fundraiser at Selwood Farm in Alpine. Since 2016, the event has raised over \$100,000.

FarmPAC Candidates Victorious

A labama Farmers Federation members celebrated Nov. 6 victories of FarmPAC-endorsed candidates who won 161 of 163 elections.

Federation President Jimmy Parnell said the results are an endorsement of conservative policies causing regulatory reform and record unemployment.

"Voters sent a strong message supporting economic growth, accountable government and family values," Parnell said. "We look forward to working with the governor, Alabama Legislature and all elected officials to continue moving our state forward."

Gov. Kay Ivey was elected to a full, four-year term. Republicans won all statewide constitutional offices, including Lt. Gov. Will Ainsworth, Attorney General Steve Marshall, Secretary of State John Merrill, State Auditor Jim Zeigler and Public Service Commissioners Jeremy

Oden and Chip Beeker. State Treasurer John McMillan and Commissioner of Ag & Industries Rick Pate were unopposed on the November ballot.

FarmPAC-endorsed candidates also were victorious in contested judicial races, including Alabama Supreme Court Chief Justice Tom Parker and Supreme Court Justice, Place 4, Jay Mitchell.

All seven Alabama congressmen were re-elected, and 133 of 135 endorsed candidates won their races for Alabama Legislature.

The Federation recommended a "yes" vote on three of four statewide constitutional amendments. All three passed. Amendment 1 allows public display of the Ten Commandments; Amendment 2 affirms the rights of unborn children; and Amendment 4 reduces expenses associated with late-term special elections for legislative seats.

Hurricane Michael Recovery Begins In Wiregrass

recovering from Hurricane Michael, a Category 4 storm that hit Florida beaches Oct. 10 before whirling a destructive path through Alabama's Wiregrass region.

The area's cotton crop took a beating, with near 70 mph winds ripping lint from bolls. Wind and rain damaged remaining lint quality, too, in what was expected to be a bumper crop.

Downed fences, scattered cattle, destroyed structures, snapped timber and damaged crops were common sights in the area.

Officials with the Alabama Forestry Commission (AFC) estimate timber losses at nearly \$20 million in Houston County alone. Aerial surveys conducted by the AFC indicate over 42,300 forested acres were damaged by the storm.

President Donald Trump approved a major disaster declaration for the state Nov. 5. Funding from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) is available in Geneva, Henry, Houston and Mobile counties.

The Alabama Farmers Federation and state officials are working to secure further disaster declarations from Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue. During the Sunbelt Ag Expo in Moultrie, Georgia, following the storm, Perdue and Vice President Mike Pence pledged to help farmers recover.

To assist farmers in the rebuilding process, the Federation also established a relief fund.

"Farmers in south Alabama received an outpouring of support from neighbors and people across the country," said Federation President Jimmy Parnell. "Many asked where they can donate to help farmers who've lost their crops and barns, so we have created a special fund within the Alabama Farmers Agriculture Foundation to accept these gifts."

"Hurricane Michael devastated crops, homes, barns and livelihoods in the Wiregrass," said Parnell, who is also president of the foundation. "Farmers are resilient, but recovery takes time and money. Alabama farmers are grateful for financial help from friends and supporters — and covet your thoughts and prayers during the rebuilding process."

All funds collected by the foundation through Nov. 30 will be targeted toward farmer losses not covered by a farmowner policy, crop insurance or disaster relief programs.

Chronic wasting disease (CWD) was found in a second deer in Mississippi. The 18-month-old, free-ranging male whitetailed deer was emaciated and behaving abnormally. It was euthanized Oct. 8. This is the closest case to Alabama, which banned importing members of the deer family in 1973. Alabama's Department of Conservation and Natural Resources has tested nearly 8,000 deer since 2002. CWD has not been detected in the state.

EPA Extends Dicamba Registration Two Years

Dicamba registration is extended two years, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) announced Oct. 31.

The extension is for over-the-top (OTT) use controlling weeds in fields for cotton and soybean plants genetically engineered to resist dicamba.

This action was determined by input from and extensive collaboration among EPA, state regulators, farmers, academic researchers, pesticide manufacturers and other stakeholders. Label changes include

- Two-year registration (until Dec. 20, 2020)
- Only certified applicators may apply dicamba OTT
- Prohibiting OTT application on soybeans 45 days after planting and cotton 60 days after planting
- Decreasing OTT applications for cotton from four to two
- Applications allowed one hour after sunrise to two hours before sunset Visit <u>tinyurl.com/EPAdicamba</u> to learn
